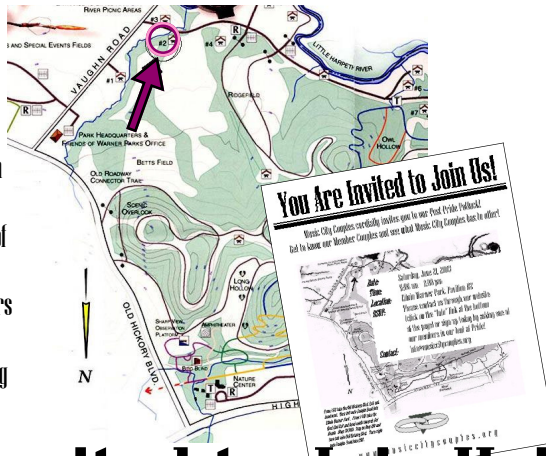

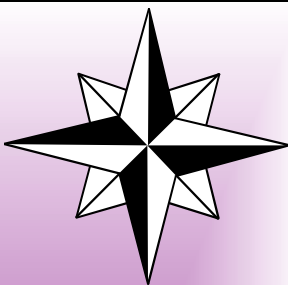

MINUTES OF MJSIC CITY COUPLES BOARD MEETING SUNDAY, MAY 18, 2003

In Attendance: Stefan, Marcus, Elaine, Ana, Angela, Risa, Larry, Bobby



Meeting called to order by Stefan at 9:00 am.

Articles for Newsletter: Mention was made that the By-Laws state each couple is supposed to contribute articles to the newsletter and several couples have not yet contributed. Suggestion was made that members write a monthly feature about topics they are familiar with, such as: Elaine and Bobby writing about current or upcoming events in music/theatre. Ana writing a medical tips/update article. Angela writing a gardening or kitchen tips article, etc. Suggestion was made that Holly and Barb write an article on the trip to Rock Island with Donald and Jeffary.

MCC Website: Larry passed out handouts he created for getting new couples online and informed us about problems he is having with MSN. He suggested the possibility us changing from MSN. Several suggestions followed such as a site called "DISCUS". Which would cost the group to have access where MSN is free. Elaine mentioned her brother-in-law hosts a website and will talk to him about options. Stefan will check into "BLOG" software to host our own site/chatroom. Larry will check into the possibilities of a customized "BLOG". Stefan mentioned that the MCC Nashville web domain is available for purchase if we wanted it, it was suggested that prospective members would probably be looking for Music City Couples on the web and not MCC to find us. Further discussion was tabled until next month.

Newsletter: Is now only posted to the website and not emailed directly to each couple.

Side Discussion: Billing for website. Check card is still in Scott's name and needs to be changed.

Financials: Elaine has not yet sent the financial report to Brian and Marcus for the newsletter and tries to do it the last week of the month. She informed us the payment has been made to the Pride committee for our booth space/the t-shirt logo. Payment has also been made and the permit received for the pavilion at the park for the after pride potluck. Quarterly dues have already been paid.

Responding to emails: When board members email with questions, it is suggested that all board members respond with an answer or opinion. Atleast reply that you did receive the email. It was also pointed out that messages seem to be going back and forth only between the board members and not among all members via the message board.

Board Meeting Minutes: Stefan apologized for not sending the minutes of the last meeting to all board members and handed out hard copy of the minutes to all members present. In the future, minutes will be given to Brian and Marcus directly after the meeting on disk. For this meeting since Stefan is conducting the meeting, Risa is taking the minutes and will type them up and forward to Stefan for distribution.

Pride: Parade will line up in front of Krispy Kreme on Elliston Place. Members participating need to be there by 9:30 for the 10:00 line up. It was decided not to put Angela's truck into the parade and all members will walk with the banner, balloons, flags, etc. We need to post a message on the message board for all members letting them know we want as many people as possible walking with us, and also to start signing up for time slots to man the booth. Was agreed that we should man the booth as couples, since we are a couples organization. It was brought up to order/make Music City Couple T-shirts with our logo for all couples par-

ticipating in Pride and this could be done at a cost to each member of approximately \$6. We will need to figure out an exact dollar amount and post a message on the website about this as money and sizes required would be needed by Friday 5/23. Checks should be made out the Music City Couples and the couple handling the ordering would be reimbursed.

The distribution of small bottles of water was brought up. Consensus of the group is if water can be donated by Sam's then go ahead. If not donated we do not need to incur the expense.

Additional items being brought to Pride will be flyers/sign up sheets for the potluck, copies of the Out & About article, photo collage of past events mounted on foamboard to be displayed on the booth. Larry will output the Photos for Risa who will take care of the mounting.

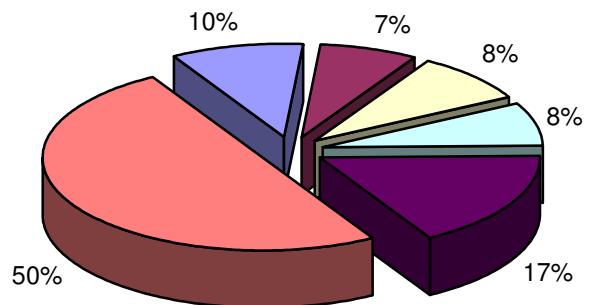

Follow up phone calls will be made by all board members after Pride to personally invite prospective members. Member packets will be available. Suggestion was made by Stefan that we submit a letter to Sam's Club of what we need and they will often make a once a year donation to non-profit organizations. Angela has already checked pricing at Sam's for items we will need. Angela and Risa stated they were planning on donated several packages of hot dogs and some sodas if Sam's will not donate. Stefan also reported that Sonic will donate cups for the event, if needed. Events for during the day suggested for a 3-legged races, Ana will bring Volleyball and Risa and Angela will bring Croquet.

Quarterly Business Meeting: Suggestion was made to hold off on the Quarterly meeting until July, after Pride. Stefan suggested Ryan's Steakhouse in Hermitage which has been redone and has a private room we can use. Larry was of the opinion that we should not meet in a restaurant setting. If a private room is available, then meeting in a restaurant setting is OK with Steve/Stefan/Elaine/Ana/Risa/Angela/Marcus & Brian.

Ad Space in Newsletter: Suggestion was made to Barter with local businesses who provide us with door prizes, etc. that we offer them business card size ad in return. This way we are contributing back to the community. Suggestion was further made to offer corporate sponsorship in return for ad space for a certain period of time. Item was tabled until next month.

Meeting was adjourned at 10:10 am.

we grew to like each other more, we exchanged pictures and agreed to meet for lunch near Shane's work. It was a very special meal - not because of the food, but because we liked each other even more after that. Several days later, Greg made a stop at Shane's house in Hermitage on his way home. This was our first personal, alone, and up close time together.

Shane and Greg have been together for 16 months now. "We feel like we've been together for much longer than that, though, because we had parallel growing-up experiences," they say.

On their first date they, "went to dinner at a Thai restaurant in Belle Meade and spent the rest of the evening together in the back seat of Shane's car in a garage. We spent our time exploring each other through all of our senses, while listening to the soundtrack to *Moulin Rouge*. It was a magical night for us." That night "Shane adopted his motto for our relationship - 'Come What May.'"

As time went on for this couple, "we felt more and more of a deep-rooted connection. We experienced flashbacks of a time when we were together as different people. This may sound different to many people, but we definitely had a past together in an earlier time. The details and feelings from the flashbacks are too clear and strong for us to dismiss. We simply accept this as part of our discovered history so we embrace and cherish it. Knowing that we went through some very tough times only strengthens our relationship now."

How you they prefer to spend an evening now? "[It] would be to sit together at sunset overlooking a lake drinking a nice bottle of Merlot and watching wildlife on the shoreline." Sounds like a perfect way to unwind!

Shane went to high school in Franklin. During the summers, he went with grandparents to central and south Florida near Orlando and in Okeechobee. After high school, he attended UT-Martin for a while and then transferred to MTSU in Murfreesboro. After a couple of years moved to the Denver, Colorado area where he stayed several years. Shane then moved back to Nashville and has been here again for almost 8 years.

Greg was born in Gainesville, Florida and moved to west Tennessee. When Volunteer State Community College in Gallatin was founded in the early 1970s, his parents moved to Gallatin to work at the college. The rest of Greg's growing up was in the middle Tennessee area where

he attended Mt Juliet High School, VSCC, and MTSU (you can start to see the parallels now). During summers in college, Greg stayed with his dad in Okeechobee working in the family hardware stores around the lake.

During these summers, Greg and Shane were in Okeechobee at the same time, seeing movies in the same theater, and dropping quarters in video games in the same arcade. After college, Greg moved to south Florida for 18 months, then to the Knoxville area for almost five years, and then back to the Nashville area.

"So many times our paths crossed without knowing it. Greg has always known that Shane was out there, being patient for the time when we finally met."

Shane and Greg have a new place, "in March, we bought a 6-acre place in Mt Juliet that we really enjoy. In addition to growing a small vegetable garden, we watch



and feed animals on our place: turkeys, squirrels, bats, raccoons, deer, crows, owls, lizards, and many kinds of other wild birds."

Shane works as a sales coordinator for a wholesale auto parts distributor based in Antioch; while Greg works for a private transportation company headquartered in Nashville as a director in the computer department.

One day, "Greg would love to open a resort for couples on the family ranch in south Florida. It's remote in the sense that it's an hour west of Ft Lauderdale. There would be plenty of alone time with Shane preparing the place for the next group of guests. Cooking, serving, and entertaining people who appreciate gracious and sincere hospitality is extremely rewarding."

Shane's ideal job is to be Brad Pitt's personal assistant. Realistically, he would love to be involved with people. Running a campground for gay couples and their families would be great.

As for advice to share, "Ask us this question in another 30 years while we're sitting on a fishing pier somewhere - we might have more advice then!"

Be sure to introduce yourself next time you get to see this full-hearted couple!

Coming out and living in Ft. Lauderdale for over twenty years, I looked forward every June to the Pride Picnic. It meant a three mile long parade that wound thru the streets of downtown and ended with a huge picnic with food, music and friends. But until I sat down to try and write an article on Pride I don't know that I really gave its true meaning much thought.

Webster's lists the definition of Pride as: a quality or state of being proud. But what exactly are we proud of? I don't consider my life (not lifestyle) any different from my straight brother and sister. Like most couples, we have a home, jobs, animals, bills to pay and two families to juggle. We love the same, comfort each other in times of crisis and rejoice at the good times. So what exactly makes our lives so different that we feel the need to announce to the world that we are gay or lesbian and proud of it?

In August of 1967, two years before the Stonewall riots, PRIDE (Personal Rights in Defense and Education) was a monthly newsletter which became known as *The Advocate*, a name we still know today. The Stonewall Riots is considered by most, the turning point in the gay rights movement. One observer called it, "the hairpin drop heard 'round the world." According to *The Advocate*, the Stonewall Riots happened quite spontaneously, on the night after Judy Garland's funeral, when, with their heightened emotions, the drag queens, along with a handful of butch dykes at the Stonewall Inn, came to the end of their patience with the police raids on Greenwich Village gay bars over the previous few weeks. But the moment was right, primed by a decade of militant movements, Stonewall provided young gays and lesbians with an unprecedented vitality and conviction in the struggle for gay rights. The Gay Revolution, as it was then called, also helped pave the way for the lesbian-feminist revolution which acted side-by-side with the gay movement. While, 1969, saw the birth of the gay movement, it would take almost twenty years before the "lesbian and gay movement" could be born.

Many events have occurred over the last thirty years that have helped shape the gays rights movement, here are just a few highlights:

During the '70's:

- First Gay Liberation National Conference in held in Texas

- Sodomy Laws repealed
- CBS accused of antigay discrimination for not hiring a gay man
- Black Panther leader Huey Newton called on blacks to view the Gay Liberation Front and the Women's Liberation Front as "friends and potential allies"
- A Florida Circuit Court ruled that a Miami city ordinance against cross-dressing in unconstitutional
- The American Psychiatric Association declares that homosexuality is not a psychiatric disorder
- Over 100,000 people take part in the first march on Washington for lesbian and gay rights

During the '80's:

- Center for Disease Control reports in its weekly report on morbidity and mortality about five men with a rare form of pneumonia and researchers discover the HIV virus that causes AIDS
- A nineteen year old Eagle Scout from San Francisco sued the Boy Scouts of America for ousting him over his homosexuality, and won.
- In 1982, Wisconsin becomes the first

state to pass a gay-rights law

- Elizabeth Taylor announced that she was the chairwoman of the newly formed American Foundation for AIDS Research
- Rock Hudson dies a year and a half after being diagnosed with AIDS

During the '90's:

- In one of the first federal gay-rights victories, the U.S. Senate approved a hate-crimes bill that included crimes based on sexual orientation which President Bush later signed into law
- Janna Van de Hoef and Pauly Van der Wildt officially register their relationship at the Deventer's City Hall in the Netherlands, becoming the first legally married same-sex couple in the country
- Two days after disclosing he had AIDS, Freddie Mercury of the rock group Queen dies
- "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" becomes law for the US Military
- Ellen Degeneres' character comes out on national television
- The death of Matthew Shephard sparks a march on Washington and a renewed push for gay hate crime legislation

It's been over thirty years since Stonewall, years filled with change, tragedy and triumph. Which brings me back to my original question, "What is Pride"? If we were to look back at history in general, it would be easy to see that the freedoms we enjoy today, we owe to our predecessors. The struggles and wars that they fought, give us the freedoms and privileges we take for granted today. So on June 7th when we are celebrating Pride in a public park, in the middle of Nashville, on a beautiful sunny afternoon, perhaps we should take a moment and reflect on the thousands of people who wouldn't have dreamed this possible thirty, forty, fifty years ago, and be Proud, for them.

set I was when comic books went to 35 cents.

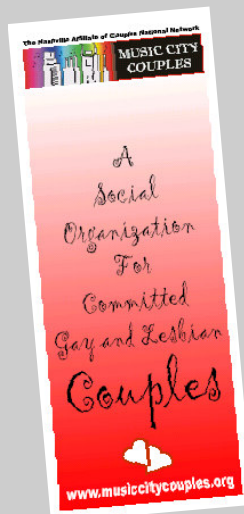

Chocolate Fondue

Ingredients:

- ½ cup heavy cream
- 8 ounces semisweet chocolate, finely chopped
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 pound cake, cut into 1" cubes
- 2 pints strawberries, rinsed and hulled

In a small saucepan over medium-low heat, warm the cream until steam begins to rise. Remove from the heat, add the chocolate and stir until melted, smooth and creamy. Add the vanilla and stir to blend. Add to the fondue pot (following directions for safely using you fondue pot).

Serve with individually marked skewers, pound cake and strawberries. Enjoy!
